A new award was introduced this year. Named in recognition of the tremendous contribution the school's Director of Sport has made to PE and Sport at John Spence and in the wider community over his long career, the Bobby Graham Cup will be awarded annually to the student who has achieved something outstanding in the area of PE and Sport over the course of the academic year.

The first winner of the Cup was England and Sunderland football player and North Tyneside Outstanding Achievement Award nominee Jessica Brown.

Many other individual and team successes were recognised and rewarded over the course of the evening which ended with the now traditional John Spence Staff Dance Routine.

NEW BUILD HEADS TOWARDS COMPLETION

Although we were able to move into our brand new building in November, work on the school site is not yet complete.

The contractors are currently busy constructing the new Plaza which will lead from the entrance to the school site on Preston Road, down to the front of the new building and along to the Arts Block. The drainage system for the new, additional, grass pitches is now being laid and the concrete foundations for our Bicycle Maintenance Building have been poured.



The new Bicycle Storage Area should be complete by September, providing a secure place for students and staff to leave their bikes during the day.

Access to the school buildings should also be much easier by the beginning of next term, although work will continue on the site until the end of November.

By the hand-over date at the beginning of December new pitches will have been laid out, a floodlit MUGA (multi-use games area) will have been built and all of the landscaping will be complete.

We are very pleased with the building Sir Robert McAlpine have constructed for us and look forward to taking back the complete site before next term ends.



Our annual School Prom for Year 11 leavers was held at St James' Park on 6th July. The student Prom Committee, supported by Mrs Ward and the Year 11 tutors, worked hard throughout the year to ensure that the event was a great success.

THIS IS CREATIVE ENTERPRISE



Involvement in the annual This Is Creative Enterprise program has become a regular part of the John Spence Calendar. TICE is a program which develops the creative skills of young people and gives them an insight into the commercial and business side of the Creative Arts.



This year saw our students getting involved in a number of exciting projects which took their learning outside of the normal classroom setting.

The final stage of this year's TICE program took place over a four week period and concluded with a fantastic final show at the Great North Museum. This stage required the Graphics, Music and Fashion students to respond to live briefs set by real businesses and professionals such as L'Oreal and Topshop.

Pupils had three days to create their response to the brief, and at the final

show, the work was exhibited, alongside performances from the music students.

The night was a fantastic success, with Lauren Hallewell (Year 9 - TICE Graphics) addressing the entire room to talk about her experience of the TICE program.

The work the students produced was of a very high standard and industry representatives praised them on how professional it looked. A fantastic experience.

TICE: Music

Liam Archbold and Megan Culyer, both in Year 9, were lucky enough to make it to the final of the TICE 2017 program. The music program was particularly competitive this year as the standard of musicianship across other North East schools was extremely high; both Liam and Megan did extremely well to make it to the final!

The final part of the program required our students to collaborate with students from other schools in order to form a band; each band was then given a brief to complete. All of the bands had to create a pop song and perform it; a task that was to be completed in three days! Each group of students wrote the lyrics, composed the music and then performed it live in front of an audience of four hundred people, including parents, friends and industry professionals.

Both Liam and Megan gained an awful lot of experience from the various industry professionals that they have worked with, and the skills they have used will be extremely beneficial as they embark

upon their GCSE Music course in September.

TICE: Fashion



After successfully passing an interview, ten of our students were selected to take part in the final 'CREATE' stage of Fashion TICE and they did not disappoint! They spent three days at both Northumbria and Sunderland University working with mentors that specialise in fashion blogging and fashion illustration.

Five students visited Urban Outfitters and completed a styling task that allowed them to style one staple garment in three ways — floral, 80s and nautical. The other five students visited TopShop and looked at how garments could be styled and sold as unisex products. Each student produced a final board that showcased their talent in writing and drawing and these were displayed within the Hancock Museum for family, friends and the industry to see! Well done to everyone involved.



NLT STAR AWARDS



I was lucky enough to be invited to the North Tyneside Learning Trust (NLT) awards held at the Assembly Rooms in Newcastle. Jessica Brown had been shortlisted for an Achievement awards. Jess had been nominated for her outstanding achievements in sport and, in particular, football.

SHOW RACISM THE RED CARD



Year 9 took part in our annual Show Racism The Red Card event earlier this term. Fun was had out on the field with ex-Sunderland player Gary Bennett (and a certain member of the office staff got very excited when ex-Newcastle player, Olivier Bernard, turned up at the start of the day!).

The day consisted of a whole group session where the very thorny issue of Islamophobia was tackled. As well as football on the field everyone took part in a discussion-based workshop about prejudice and discrimination in everyday life.

All students were brilliant and joined in fully, but the session which held them all spellbound was a talk given by Ali, a refugee who has lived most of his adult life in Newcastle. Ali talked them through his very eventful life, born to one Hutu and one Tutsi parent during the genocide in Rwanda. He has had to flee for his life, been arrested, kept apart from his family and then, after reaching safety in Britain, been subjected to physical and verbal racism here too. The day ended with a general Q&A session where the event leaders answered questions about their experiences of discrimination. Hopefully, everyone who took part will have learned something about themselves as well as discrimination.



POST-16 PARTNERSHIP

SCIENCE EXPRESSWAY LAUNCH

The Science Expressway for 17/18 was launched on Friday 7th July at QA. There were representatives from some of the borough's leading employers from STEM industries who were there to encourage students to consider a career in STEM subjects. All Year 9 students from QA partner schools were invited to the event where they had the opportunity to participate in four sessions during the day which looked at acceleration and gravity, chemical modelling, heart dissection and the science behind photographic techniques. This was followed by a STEM careers fair where employers were on hand to advise students on careers and career progression.



TYNEMET TASTER

All Year 10 students spent a morning at both of the Tyne Met sites experiencing some of the courses that the college has on offer. Each student selected a course they were interested in and had a taste of what that course might entail.

The students at the Coast Road Campus looked at engineering, beauty, hairdressing, health and social care, sport, uniformed services, computing and childcare. Those at the Queen Alexandra Campus accessed art and design and a full range of A-Level courses. This is just one of the opportunities that will be afforded all students throughout their time at John Spence as part of their careers, advice and guidance package.



QA TASTER

Students from John Spence were able to experience a series of masterclasses in all QA subjects to help inform decision-making in the new academic year. Students had the opportunity to sample student life in sixth form and have an introduction to subjects that they may not have had the opportunity to study at GCSE. A key part of the day was to inform students about potential careers linked to studying certain A level subjects and to outline case studies of former John Spence students who have gone on to progress to university and beyond.



My Great Granddad

In the latest of our series of pieces of students' work which explores an aspect of their own family history, Year 9 student Megan Sanderson celebrates the Life and Times of her Great Grandfather Joe W Sanderson

Joe Sanderson was my great granddad. He was born on 24th November 1914. Joe joined the army on the first day war was declared, 3rd September 1939. He was a member of the Royal Artillery; he fought throughout the war and was even awarded an oak leaf and a medal. He was also mentioned in dispatches for an act of outstanding bravery when he and another officer fought their way across a bridge that was being bombed by the enemy.

Towards the end of the war he had advanced to the rank of R.S.M (Regimental Sergeant Major) and was part of the battalion that was sent to liberate the prisoners in a concentration camp called Bergen Belsen. Little was known of the camp and Joe was in charge of an advance group of three men who were sent in on motorbikes to scout out the camp. Belsen, as they entered, looked like a holiday camp, but when they drove further in they encountered the horror of what was actually going out inside.

Literally thousands of decaying and dead bodies were piled on top of each other all around the camp and also inside the huts. The Germans tried to leave the camp after the allied forces had entered, but were rounded up and

brought back to account for their atrocities.

The German officers and soldiers were forced to dig graves and dispose of the dead.

Joe and his battalion stayed at Belsen for roughly two months to oversee the liberation of the prisoners and the disposal of the bodies, many of which were still in the huts that had to be set on fire due to Typhoid being rampant in the whole camp.

Most of the German officers, both men and women, were tried as war criminals at the Nuremberg war trials, many of whom were executed. My great grandad Joe was a witness at several of these executions.

After leaving Belsen, Joe and his troops were given a two week rest and recuperation break in order to recover from the disturbing scenes they had witnessed.

After the war Joe continued to be a part of the army, as a member of the T.A. (Territorial Army), where he was commissioned as an officer and worked up until the age of 64.

Unfortunately, Joe died in 1998 at the age of 84, but his memory lives on through the legacy that he left behind.



WELCOME TO WONDERLAND

A number of students entered a competition to write a 'mini saga' for the Young Writers' Welcome to Wonderland competition. Six students from John Spence; Emily Chandler, Calum Beattie, Ripley Waugh, Harry Scott, Adam Steel and Chloe Sherriff have had their work selected for publication. The anthology 'Welcome to Wonderland' will be available from September and we will have copies in the school library, hopefully autographed by our authors, for students to borrow.

Girls Rugby

Over 40 students from year 7, 8, 9 and 10 took part in the RFU annual girls beach rugby tournament at Longsands Beach, Tynemouth. The tournament is designed to showcase the talented girls from around the North East. This year saw a record-breaking number of girls taking part and in total there were over 70 teams from across Northumberland Schools that entered the U13 and U15 touch rugby tournament. The girls enjoyed a brilliant day out with both the U13 and U15 A teams remaining unbeaten throughout the day. It was great to see the girls develop their rugby skills throughout the day and demonstrate some excellent team work.

Terry Whittock retires after twenty-three years at the school as a Geography teacher and Head of Year. In his time as Head of Year he has successfully guided four cohorts of students throughout their five years stay at the school.

John Atkinson and Angela Lund, both Assistant Headteachers at the school, retire having each spent fourteen years at the school. John led our very successful Maths Department throughout his time with us whilst Angela reorganised and managed a SEND Department which is considered to be amongst the best in the area.

Newcastle Rugby Foundation Rugby Academy

SKY TRY – Year 7 and 9 Boys

Off the back of this we will look to feed the participants into the local community club. We are looking to put a full pathway in place that works in line with the local clubs training and games. In addition to this we will be delivering a series of playing opportunities to allow the participants to maximise their potential and offering teacher CPD for teachers to carry on the work once the funding has finished. On top of this we will offer FREE or highly discounted tickets for participants to come along and watch Newcastle Thunder play.

Rugby Leaders Programme – Year 10 Boys

The Northumberland Young Rugby Leaders Programme is a new initiative from the Northumberland RFU to develop school students to take on a Rugby Ambassador role within their establishment. Throughout the year, aligned with the rugby festivals for years 7 and 8, the Rugby League are offering two students from each high school the opportunity to complete a comprehensive list of courses on the morning then develop their practical abilities in the afternoon by refereeing the festivals. This year we have started the program early with Kevin Barber, Paul Hughes, Joe Jackson, Lewis Lowden, Thomas Walker, Robert Mitchell, Ryan Higginson, Mark Snowdon, Blaine Ridley and Robert Wilson already completing around 20 hours of ambassador work.

Following on from the success in the indoor season the girls took to the outdoor competitions. In the Under 13 competition at Tynemouth CC we had so much interest from Year 7 and 8 girls at practice we were able to enter 3 teams. All teams won games over the course of the day and developed their skills on the way. The Under 15 competition took place at Benwell Hill CC and the girls were hungry to seal a victory after narrowly losing out in the final at the indoor competition. They saw off teams from Ashington, St Mary's, Churchill and St Thomas More to make the semi-finals to against Ponteland High. It was a close game with the girls coming out on top to win by 4 runs. In the final they faced Queen Elizabeth High School who they had narrowly lost to in the final of the indoor tournament. The stakes were high but the girls put on an excellent batting performance to put 87 runs on the board. Keeping a tight field and displaying nerves of steel the girls kept the opposition down to 85 runs to win by 2 overall and be crowned Northumberland county champions. They will now represent Northumberland in the county finals.

The girls have been hugely successful in the leagues and tournaments this year, almost keeping a clean sheet to match the previous year's form.

We were able to enter A and B teams in Year 7 and 8 in the North Tyneside tournaments with the A teams for both year groups winning overall. The Year 7 B team came runners up in the tournament, which is the best achievement for a B team in any competition.

Every Monday night the Year 7 and 8's teams have competed against other schools in a North Tyneside League where they have all have been highly successful. The Year 9 and 10 teams followed suit by winning their tournaments, but unfortunately the Year 11's narrowly lost out on a win and came runners up.



The theme for this year's Mouth of the Tyne Pageant was 'Coast' and the aim was to celebrate what makes our coast special: from the flora and fauna to the outdoor activities like surfing, swimming, running and cycling, dog walking, kite flying and bee keeping. As usual, our students did their best to contribute to the success of this important local event.

Our pupils supported LP Dance and Education and the team that make Whiteley Bay Carnival happen. This was in conjunction with the Mouth of the Tyne Festival and worked in partnership with the North Tyneside Music Hub.
