


Our top students have performed phenomenally. From Year 10, Anisha has managed a stupendous 45,000 SRP. A student who met a minimum weekly expectation of 300 SRP for the full thirty weeks of the programme would be on 9000 by the end. Anisha has done five times that. It's so impressive. Then, from Year 9, Aoki has gained 35,000 SRP and she's only been here for twelve weeks of the programme. Wow, that is unbelievable. Emma, from Year 11, accrued 30,000 SRP whilst Niamh, Year 10, hit 25,000. Ellie led the way from Year 7 with 24,000 whilst Sophie and Ruby, Year 9 and 10 respectively, managed well over 21,000. The top Year 8 student was Lena at 20,000 SRP. Those students that are still here have been rewarded with Amazon Vouchers that celebrate their achievement.

We look forward to next year, enjoying reading and developing our skills. Well done to everyone who has taken part in the Sparx Reader programme this year.



school in time for the scholars' - exhausted but satisfied! A special mention to Mr Black's mum, who we met quite coincidentally at the picnic spot!

GEOGRAPHY FIELDWORK TRIP



Year 10 geography students had an exciting trip down to Byker, the Quayside and Gosforth at the end of June. We went to these parts of Newcastle for our primary human data collection to fill out environmental quality surveys and land use maps. We had criteria to explore with a focus on the litter score of the place, the noise score, pollution, roof quality, garden size and parking score. We had to give them a score out of 5 with 5 being the poorest quality and 1 being the better quality.

As we went from Byker to the Quayside and Gosforth, we realised there was an increase in the quality of the housing and the garden sizes. Better standards were apparent. We realised this when the scores went

from 3, 4 and 5 to practically all 1. It was very interesting and informative.

We got to these places by a coach which was only a ten to fifteen minute drive from North Shields. We went with our three geography teachers: Mrs Pilkington, Miss Howard and Mr Langley. We all got split into groups of three, with about ten of us in each group. Our teachers helped us get safely to these places and it was actually quite good fun.

After we visited the sites and filled out our environmental surveys, we went to the Boating Lake in Tynemouth to have a half an hour break to sit and enjoy our lunch. After that, we walked down to Long Sands beach to conduct our physical primary data collection. We wrote a field sketch title and outlined the main features of the landscape with a pencil and then added details to the sketch to give more information about the landscape. After we did that, we went onto the sand and did a wave count. We did this by setting a timer of one minute and measuring the waves. If there were 10-15 then they were

destructive waves and if there were 6-9 then they were constructive waves. We did this five times to see if there were any anomalies but every time it was a destructive wave pattern. This tells us that Longsands does need sea defences to protect it from the waves.

Finally, we measured and recorded a beach profile. We did this by selecting sample points for the beach profile across



the width of the beach. At each sample, we used a gun clinometer to measure the steepness of the beach. Bearings were taken from the eye level of one of us of a similar height then we measured the distance along the ground and recorded this information alongside the slope angle.

All in all, it was a busy day and we were tired but we did feel as though we had accomplished a lot. This was very satisfying.
